

How Your Dollar Sparks Hope

**Below are examples of how charitable organizations maximize your gifts!
What can your donation provide?**

United Way of Lee County:

- \$8.00 — Provides the funds for an underserved child to receive a complete oral cleaning, an x-ray, fluoride treatment, and an exam from a licensed dentist in the Auburn City School's Dental Clinic.
- \$15.00 — The Food Bank of East Alabama can acquire 210 pounds of food to feed the hungry.
- \$30.00 — Allows the Lee County Literacy Coalition to purchase materials and train a volunteer to help an illiterate adult reach a level four reading ability. From this level, a new reader can build up their vocabulary and practice their reading skills on their own, a task that would have been impossible before.
- \$48.00 — The Rape Counselors of East Alabama can provide a full day of education to over 100 elementary school students about bullying and how to avoid being bullied. AND, they could have a full day of education on rape prevention and healthy relationships for over 100 middle and high school students.
- \$50.00 — An elderly citizen on a low, fixed income can receive food monthly from the Community Market Brown Bag Program.
- \$63.00 — The Domestic Violence Intervention Center can be provide a victim with food and shelter for 5 days.
- \$72.00 — Special Deliveries can help a low-income mother purchase a month's supply of diapers for her infant.
- \$150.00 — Allows the American Red Cross to purchase new clothes, shoes, and a coat for one family member who has lost everything in a house fire.

2nd Chance:

- \$100 buys groceries for the shelter for five days when it's at capacity (20 residents)
- \$75 will pay the water bill for the shelter for three weeks
- \$50 will provide two weeks of public transportation for shelter residents to get to appointments or job interviews
- \$39 pays for one night in a motel for a male victim fleeing an abusive relationship or a female victim escaping with adolescent male children
- \$25 will pay for paper products at the shelter for 10 days
- \$18 will replace a driver's license
- \$6 will pay to transport a victim from the Hospital Emergency Room to the shelter
- \$12 will replace a birth certificate

Montgomery Humane Society:

- \$20 provides preventive vaccinations for two puppies
- \$35 neuters 1 male cat
- \$40 provides one month of food for five cats
- \$45 spays 1 female cat
- \$50 provides heartworm test for two dogs
- \$55 neuters 1 male dog
- \$65 spays 1 female dog
- \$250 pays for one animal cruelty investigation

United Way of Selma and Dallas County:

- \$52.00 pledge will provide \$1,000.00 worth of free prescription drugs.
- \$52.00 will provide a full battery of medical tests for 3 patients.
- \$52.00 will provide 30 free meals to the hungry.

Alabama Kidney Foundation, Montgomery Chapter:

- A gift of \$35 will provide transportation for 1 dialysis patient to and from treatment for 1 week.
- A gift of \$50 will provide a blood pressure cuff for 1 kidney patient with hypertension.
- A gift of \$100 will provide the funds to give 50 dialysis patients gift bags at the holidays.
- A gift of \$150 will provide 1 kidney transplant patient with immunosuppressant medication for 1 week.
- A gift of \$350 will provide 2 kidney patients with support from our Daily Living Needs program so they can pay for medication, an electric or gas bill, or other critical needs.
- A gift of \$500 will provide educational materials for 50 patients at 1 Patient Education Conference.

Alabama Rural Coalition For The Homeless:

- \$40.00 – Provides a safe and decent nights stay at a hotel for a HOMELESS person.
- \$250.00 – Provides one month's rent for a family in an Alabama Rural County, who would otherwise be HOMELESS.
- \$75.00 – Can provide electricity for one month to keep a family from becoming HOMELESS.
- \$100.00 – Will provide food for one week for a family of six who are moving from HOMELESS to REHOUSED.
- \$30.00 – Will provide blankets for a HOMELESS family of five to keep them warm on cold winter nights.
- \$15.00 – Will provide a sweat suit, oral hygiene products and under garments for a HOMELESS CHILD.
- \$160.00 – Provides a month's daycare for a previously HOMELESS child.

United Way of the Chattahoochee Valley:

- \$20 per week will provide 52 youth the opportunity to participate in a structured afterschool program for one year.
 - \$20 per week will provide 50 families in financial distress with free counseling and assistance.
 - \$20 per week will provide alcohol and substance abuse relapse prevention services to 70 people.
 - \$10 per week will provide five one hour sessions of speech and language therapy for a child with Autism.
 - \$10 per week will provide one teenage girl with an eating disorder to receive treatment for one year.
 - \$10 per week will provide 75 youth with swimming lessons.
 - \$5 per week will provide 1000 pounds of food for food pantries across the community.
 - \$5 per week will provide seven weekly bus passes to newly homeless individuals to seek assistance from community programs.
 - \$5 per week will provide one domestic violence victim with 43 days of shelter, counseling and legal advocacy.
 - \$2 per week will provide back to school supplies for ten youth.
 - \$2 per week will provide 57 meals for needy children.
 - \$2 per week will provide a school-based mentoring program in one new school.

Jean Dean RIF (Reading Is Fundamental)/Alabama Kiwanis Foundation:

- Your \$3 buys a *quality, age-appropriate book* (worth \$6.95 retail) *for an at-risk young child ...*
for most, the FIRST and ONLY BOOK in the home.
- Your \$3, spent on that book for a child-properly documented (and we do)
becomes an in-kind donation to the site served of \$15.
which *justifies additional grants* of \$60 for added services to the child and the family--
PLUS the child gets a book!
- ** A big return for your \$3 donation.
- Your \$200 will buy *60 quality, age-appropriate books* (worth \$1,390 retail) *for a classroom of 20 at-risk young children...*
for most, the FIRST and ONLY BOOKS in their home.
- \$200 spent on those 3 books during the year for one classroom of 20 children, properly documented (and we do)
becomes an in-kind donation to the site served of \$1000.
which *justifies additional grants* of \$4000 for added services to the children and their families--
PLUS the 20 children get 3 books each!
- **A big return for a \$200 donation.

Autauga Interfaith Care Center:

- \$5 donation will allow us to buy \$56.00 worth of food to distribute to our neighbors in need.

Humane Society of Elmore County:

\$20 provides vaccinations for two puppies/dogs or kittens/cats

\$40 spays or neuters one female or male cat

\$60 spays or neuters one female or male dog

\$20 provides heartworm testing for two dogs

\$200 covers one heartworm treatment for a medium size dog

\$70 feeds/houses one dog or one cat for a week

\$100 covers an adoption fee for a dog

\$80 covers an adoption fee for a cat

United Way of Madison County and its collaborative partners:

- \$1 per week could provide:
 - One dental cleaning for a child through HEALS, Inc. (Health Establishments at Local Schools)
 - A handrail for a senior through CASA of Madison County (Case Assurance System for the Aging and Homebound)
 - Pack of gum
- \$5 per week could provide:
 - Membership for a child through Boys and Girls Club
 - Rehabilitation services including housing and food for a person for almost two months through Pathfinder
 - Premium cup of coffee
- \$10 per week could provide:
 - A comfort kit and a blanket for 50 disaster clients through American Red Cross
 - Discounted medication for two clients for a year through Catholic Center of Concern
 - A lunch out
- \$20 per week could provide:
 - Shelter for an abused woman and her children for two weeks at HOPE place through Crisis Services of North Alabama
 - Child Abuse prevention and safety information for 125 children through National Children's Advocacy Center
 - A pair of movie tickets

United Way of Etowah County:

A donation of \$2/week x 52 weeks = \$104

\$104 helps low-income seniors maintain a healthy life style through exercise classes given at Campbell Court.

A donation of \$5/week x 52 weeks = \$260

\$260 assists one family's recovery from the devastation of a house fire.

Your investment gives them food, clothing, shelter and counseling to get them back to their life before the fire.

\$260 provides a safe home for a child placed in emergency foster care. It also makes available diapers and clothing items for that child.

A donation of \$10/week x 52 weeks = \$520

\$520 provides a disabled child the opportunity to attend summer camp (with one-on-one supervision) and have recreation experiences as never before.

\$520 will also assist in placing local children in relationships with a Big Brother or Big Sister providing the mentoring relationship young people need.

American Cancer Society:

- \$60 Buys one case of latex gloves
- \$100 Provide 10 patient information services
- \$120 Buys one case of 144 Petri dishes
- \$150 Buys one case of 500 test tubes
- \$250 Buys wigs for 3 cancer patients or buys 83 hours of toll-free access to the National Cancer Information Center
- \$300 Provides transportation for one patient for 30 treatments
- \$500 Buys Reach to Recovery visits for 5 women
- \$800 Cost of "Look Good...Feel Better" consultations for 4 women
- \$1,000 Expenses for 1 patient for one day at Hope Lodge
- \$2,000 Cost for a new microscope
- \$3,000 Expenses for 1 patient in an ACS funded clinical trial
- \$5,000 Provides support group programs for 100 patients or buys a one-year supply of radioactive compounds to use in developing a new diagnostic test for prostate cancer
- \$8,000 Buys an ultraviolet light source microscope and camera for identification of reactions of cell proteins by antibodies tagged with fluorescent dyes in a new diagnostic procedure for cervical cancer
- \$10,000 One month's funding of the average American Cancer Society Research Grant or can purchase an apparatus to slice very thin sections of tumor tissues to study the gene amplification in breast cancer or hormone failure in prostate cancer

United Methodist Children's Home:

- A \$20 gift...can supply a child or a family with a Bible or Bible storybook.
- A \$35 gift ... Allows us to buy a ticket for one child to attend a cultural event they might not otherwise get the opportunity to experience
- A \$40 gift... Will buy a month's worth of cleaning supplies for one of our Babies First homes for young mothers
- A gift of \$40 can provide hours of fun and physical activity for children living in our group homes.
- A \$50 gift ... Would allow us to buy cake, ice cream, and a birthday present for a child in our foster care program
- A \$50...gift can provide much needed funds for field trips, tutors, and school supplies.
- A \$100 gift... Will buy a new comforter set for a child in one of our group homes.
- A \$200 gift...can help to offset a month of care for an abused child.
- A \$250 gift... can send a child on a spiritual retreat or provide bible study materials for a group of teenage mothers.
- A \$350 gift... Would be used towards buying a new mattress for a child in one of our group homes
- A \$350 gift... can help provide a room, food, clothing, and tuition for a young mother and her baby
- A \$500 gift... will enable a child to invest their free time in enriching cultural and educational opportunities
- A \$700 gift... Is needed to buy a new couch for the living room of one of our group homes
- A \$1,000 gift... Would furnish one of our graduating seniors with a computer they can use as they go off to college
- A gift of \$1,500 would cover the cost of tuition and books for a young adult seeking vocational certification.
- A gift of \$3,500 will cover tuition and books for one college student.
- A \$14,000 gift... would allow us to take all of the children living in our group homes on a short summer vacation.
- A gift of \$18,000 will supply one of our Transitional Living Programs with a compact car.
- A gift of \$30,000 will supply one of our group homes with a 12 passenger van.

Habitat for Humanity of Autauga and Chilton Counties:

\$15 buys a sheet of floor decking

\$30 buys a box of floor tile

\$50 buys faucets

\$75 buys a window

\$100 buys shutters

\$150 buys a water heater

\$250 buys front & back doors

\$300 buys a kitchen range

\$3,000 buys a Building lot

UNITED WAY OF CENTRAL ALABAMA AGENCIES:

\$45 will pay for a day in a substance abuse residential treatment center (Fellowship House)

\$1,250 will pay for one month of sheltered employment for a person with disabilities; (each client gets 63 units of service); 89% were able to maintain employment in the community (AL Goodwill)

\$317 will pay for one month in supportive housing for homeless addicted women on the road to recovery; 75% of clients moved from supportive housing to permanent housing (Aletheia House)

\$1,570 will provide a year of early intervention services (speech and physical therapy) for infants and toddlers with developmental delays; 69% of children receiving at least one year of service made significant progress in at least one area of development (Arc of Shelby County)

\$45 will provide a senior citizen and/pr physically challenged person with transportation to medical appointments, grocery stores and recreational activities for one month; this is an average of 3 trips a month (Collat) \$15 a trip

\$227 will pay for a domestic abuse victim to get temporary shelter, case management and counseling (19 days avg. length of stay - \$12 a day for service) (Daybreak)

\$670 will pay for counseling services for one student at-risk for delinquent or violent behavior during the school year; 87% of students in the program had a decrease in the number of school suspensions (IMPACT)

\$538 pays for a week of summer camp for children who would otherwise be at home alone (Legacy YMCA)

\$150 pays for one counseling session for a woman or child; for clients participating in at least 4 sessions (\$600) 75% show a decrease in depression scores (Oasis)

\$110 pays for a homeless woman to use a Day Center where she can shower, have a hot meal, do laundry and I&R (Pathways)

\$5,216 pays for services (shelter, education, meals, therapy) to a child or adolescent at risk of severe emotional and behavior problems; 92% of program participants showed an increase in school attendance, 90% decrease in school suspensions, 70% increase in academic performance (Salvation Army , Birmingham)

\$2,830 pays for a high risk adolescent to receive services in a day treatment center as an alternative to incarceration; 87% program participants had no further involvement with the juvenile justice system due to delinquent activity (St. Clair County Day Program)

\$20 pays for a ride for an elderly, disabled or very low income person to a medical appointment (\$283 per client); 71% of clients reported that transportation improved or maintained their capacity to live independently. (Travelers Aid Society)

\$574 will pay for one month sheltered employment for a person with multiple, severe disabilities; each client gets 240 units of service - \$8.33 each day of employment (Workshops)

Assuring help for people in need



See What Your Dollars Can Do

A bi-weekly payroll pledge to Global Impact charities adds up to big results over the course of the year.

\$200 per pay period

- * Builds a well with a hand pump that will bring clean water to 500 people in Africa.
- * Establishes a Trust Group and provides microcredit loans and training to 40 women living in poverty in Nicaragua.

\$100 per pay period

- * Provides emergency survival kits with food, water, blankets, temporary shelter and cooking utensils for 26 displaced families in Pakistan.
- * Stocks a farm in South America with cows, sheep, goats, pigs and enough chickens to provide food and income for 10 families.

\$50 per pay period

- * Delivers seven complete classroom kits to children in Myanmar whose schools were destroyed.
- * Supports four victims of sexual violence in Darfur with health care, rights awareness training and job skills.

\$25 WILL PROVIDE PAPER PRODUCTS AT A SHELTER FOR 10 DAYS

\$30 WILL FILL A BACKPACK WITH SCHOOL SUPPLIES
